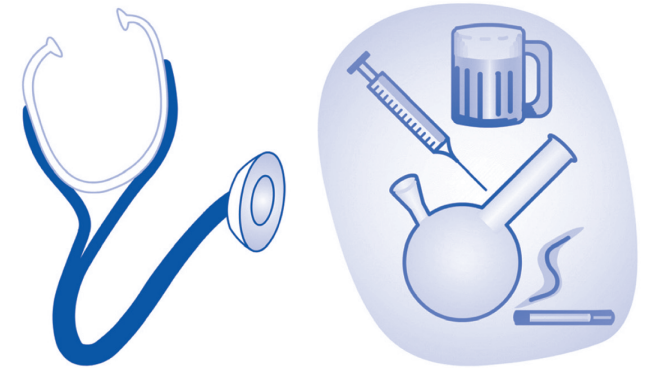

ABOUT THE COURSE

Although substance abuse is a leading cause of death, disability and disease in the United States today, several surveys have shown that physicians are not adequately trained to recognize and treat addicted patients nor to identify susceptible populations and help prevent addiction. To help address these deficiencies, and to help produce a cadre of physicians who are competent to mentor medical students, a weekend CME course on addiction medicine will be sponsored by Albany Medical College (AMC) on November 14-15, 2008. The course will consist of several presentations given by experts in the field. This course, organized by Dr. Stanley Glick and Dr. Isabelle Maisonneuve from AMC, will be led by Dr. Steven Kipnis from the NYS Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS).

TARGET AUDIENCE

Although this course is designed for physicians and addiction counselors, other healthcare providers are welcome.

EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of the course, the participant will be able to:

- Understand the neurobiological mechanisms mediating addiction as well as the actions of pharmacological treatments.
- List common characteristics of patients presenting with alcohol and/or drug abuse problems.
- Recognize the importance of routinely asking all patients about alcohol, tobacco and other drug use.
- Perform age, gender, and culturally appropriate substance abuse screening.
- Appreciate the issues associated with treating pain in the context of substance abuse.
- Provide brief interventions to patients with substance abuse disorders.
- Use effective methods of counseling patients to help prevent and treat substance abuse disorders.
- Refer patients with substance abuse disorders to appropriate treatment settings.
